Notice to club delegates

This is the ninth year for Curling Week in Northern Ontario, presented by Bearskin Airlines. The dates this year are November 18-26, 2017.

Your help is needed to initiate interest and encourage participation in your local curling club. Attached is a simple outline of information and suggestions from NOCA. This year we will be holding a Closest to the Pin contest in three age categories - under 12 years of age, 12 to 17 years of age, and 18 years and over - each with 3 prizes available to be won for those Closest to the Pin. In addition, all finalists for the adult category will have their name entered in for the Grand Prize draw of two (2) tickets anywhere Bearskin Airlines flies. You may run the contest in conjunction with leagues or hold a special Closest to the Pin contest. The Official Rules for the contest are included in this Curling Week information package.

Please discuss curling week with your "events" coordinator or curling committee as soon as possible. This year we are encouraging clubs to introduce "bring-a-friend" night during regular league play. Most leagues are under way by November 19th and so bring-a-friend night is designed to get new people into your curling facility while there are curling games in progress. A pamphlet "Discover Curling" with basic information about the game is included in the Curling Week package and can be given to new persons as an outline of the game and basic rules.

Bring-a-friend: show up a little early for your league in order to show the new person around the facility and introduce them to staff and other members. Ideally, have someone who curls assist by explaining the game as it happens, as well as helping to read the scoreboard. After 2 or 3 ends (or when the friend feels ready), have the friend come to the ice to try curling for an end. If they have never been on the ice before it is probably a good idea for them to use a stick for delivery. This will enable them to deliver a stone with more ease and accuracy (they can learn a slide delivery later if they are so inclined). Have info on lessons at your facility available for the new people. End the night as usual with social time and a beverage with the opposition.

Be creative and have fun! Let's show everyone why curling is the greatest game on ice!

All NOCA affiliated clubs are eligible to participate during Curling Week.



Format:

During Curling Week, clubs will have participants attempt to draw closest to the pin. Clubs may use this as a fundraiser by having people pay a fee for each attempt to draw to the pin. Clubs may have participants draw after league play or may hold a separate draw contest night. Each participant's distance is to be recorded on the form provided by NOCA.

This year there are 3 age categories for the contest each with prizes:

- Participants under the age of 12 years (born 2006 or later)
- Participants ages 12 to 17 years (born between 2000 & 2005)
- Participants 18 years of age and over (born 1999 or before).

The person closest to the pin in each age group will be declared the club finalist. Submit the finalist information page to the NOCA office - the club finalist in each age group with the distance Closest to the Pin will be declared NOCA champion 2017. The list of great prizes to be won in each of the three age categories is attached.

Rules:

- No sweeping is allowed.
- No practice draws are allowed.
- A person may hold a target broom in the house.

The finalist(s) from each club must be registered **via email or fax** with the NOCA Executive Director by midnight Sunday November 26th. Information required will be name, address, age, distance recorded, signatures of contestant, the club President or his/her designate, and another assigned signatory.

If two or more finalists are tied with their distance to the pin, their names will be put into a hat for a draw for first / second / third place.

All the names of the adult finalists (18 years and over) will be entered for the grand prize draw of the two (2) tickets for anywhere Bearskin Airlines flies.

Basic Rules Every Curler Should Know:

- ❖ Before the game begins, a coin is tossed by the third (vice) on each team to decide which team will deliver the last stone in the first end.
- ❖ Leads and seconds should position themselves between the hog line and well to the side of the playing surface when their team is not delivering. Only skips and vices are allowed to stand in the house area.
- ❖ After brushing, curlers should walk along the sides of the sheet to return to the delivering end.
- ❖ All curlers should remain outside the house area until the thirds have agreed on the score.
- ❖ The scoring team's third is responsible for posting the score.
- ❖ Teams may not remove an opposition stone if it is in the *Free Guard Zone* until the fifth stone of the end is played.
- ❖ The team who scores in one end delivers the first stone of the next end.
- ❖ If a stone is touched by a brusher while it is moving that brusher must alert everyone of the infraction.
- ❖ In delivery, the stone must be released before it reaches the near hog line.
- ❖ A stone is out of play if it touches the sideline or completely crosses the back line.

Your friend is an avid curler and wants to share the fun with you. Curling is enjoyed by over a million Canadians and is the perfect sport for our long winters!

Curling provides a great opportunity to participate in a physically and mentally challenging activity while enjoying the traditional socializing before, during and after the game!

Two teams alternate delivering 20kg stones down the ice to the *house* (the target shape at each end of the ice). The objective is for one team to place one or more stones closer to the *button* or *pin* (centre of the house) than the opponent. Once all 16 stones (8 per team) have been delivered the score is determined for that “*end*”. A full-length game is 10 ends long, but recreational league play is generally 6 or 8 ends in length.

At the beginning of the game, the team delivering the last stone is determined by a coin toss. Last stone is also known as having the *hammer*, considered the advantage. The team that scores in an end throws the first stone in the next end.

There are four members on a curling team and each delivers two stones alternating with the opposing team. Positions and order of delivery are: 1) lead; 2) second; 3) third or vice; and 4) skip. The *skip* is responsible for strategy and calls the shots for all the players on the team.

She/he stands in the house at the end opposite to the delivering end and directs the play. When it is the skip’s turn to deliver, the third (vice) takes over the skipping duties. The lead and second are responsible for sweeping stones delivered by their teammates and they can either sweep on opposite sides or the same side of the stone. The third takes over one of the sweeping positions when the lead or second is delivering a stone.

Sweeping (or brushing) is an important skill that is used to clean the ice of frost, dirt and debris. Sweeping reduces the friction between the stone and the ice surface, which allows the stone to continue its forward momentum for longer and to curl less.

The Free Guard Zone rule – means that any opposition stone coming to rest in the area between the hog line and the tee line, excluding the house in play, may be moved but not be removed from play, until the fifth stone of the end.

To be considered in play a stone must cross the hog line at the playing end of the ice and be released by the deliverer before it reaches the near hog line. A stone is out of play if it touches the sideline or completely crosses the back line.

To start, don’t worry too much about the rules, just try it and have fun! Welcome to sport of curling!
