For those coaches who have been working away diligently with teams and perhaps haven't had time to catch up on NCCP developments, there are lots of changes since 2015. Coaches who are certified either Competition Coach or **Competition Coach** Development must earn professional development points over 5 years to maintain certification. PD points can be earned in many ways such as attendance at Curling Canada, OCC and NOCA conferences, webinars and workshops, participation in coach mentorship programs, and active coaching. To become Competition Coach Certified, you have to develop a practice plan and then be evaluated either via video or in person. We can accommodate anyone anywhere so please consider taking this final step.

RANDY IN THE RINGS: Fortin relishes role as curling official

Longtime curling fans in the area, those whose memories can harken back five decades or more, are likely to still recognize the names of the father-and-son tandem of Don and Bill Groom, both of whom were members of the rink that represented Northern Ontario at the 1960 Brier in Fort William.

Debbie (Groom) Fortin, daughter of the chairman of committee to host the 1983 Brier in Sudbury, is quite fine with the fact that she might not be as well-known in local curling circles. As the most accredited current official in the sport in this area, she understands fully than either of the two previous generation of Groom curling men. "Because curling is a 'gentleman's game,' players are there to monitor themselves," noted Fortin. "We step in when things are questioned, very similar to golf. When we are on the ice, we are dressed in black. The idea is to fade into the background – no splashy colours or anything like that."

While many within the Groom clan faded away from the sport entirely over the years, Debbie stuck with it, gravitating to the family tradition from the bevy of sports that she experienced as a teenager at Lo-Ellen Park Secondary School. "I started curling in high school," explained the 56year-old local woman. "You didn't start any younger than that back in those days.

"A lot of it had to do with strength. There was no Little Rocks for kids, so to try and push a 42-pound rock down the ice was a bit much." A member of the Sudbury Laurentian Swim Club in her youth and exceedingly active as a participant with several of the Knights' teams during her secondary school career, Fortin eventually narrowed down the scope of her involvement over the years.

"Curling was the one sport that I did stick with," she said. "That's the beauty of curling – it's an ageless game."


A lifelong club curler, for the most part – she did dip her toes briefly into the competitive women's curling scene for a couple of years – Fortin was introduced to the coaching ranks, assisting Frank Bell with the start of the Little Rocks program at the ldylwylde Golf & Country Club.

That, however, was not where she found her calling.



This is the year that these exciting new programs are officially launching – they have all been tested in various regions of Canada.

The programs provide lesson plans for each session – no more worry's about finding the time to create a program – a huge plus for the club volunteers!

These are the new Youth Programs:

- Elementary School Curling (delivered at school prior to being on ice)
- U12 Learn to Curl
- Hit-Draw-Tap
- Youth Interclub Leagues
- Triples
- U15 Challenge Cup
- U18 Learn to Curl
- Campus Learn to Curl

Along with the new Youth Programming we are growing the number of youth Trainers & Coaches – via an initiative called 'Leaders in Training'. These LIT's will ideally be 16-25 years old – but the program is open to anyone that wants to commit time and energy!

The LIT initiative does not link to the NCCP Coaching architecture, however all NCCP Coach Programming is available.

Amanda Gates and Larry Rathje are the NOCA Youth Programming Leaders. Amanda is responsible for Regions 4, 5, and 6. Larry is responsible for Regions 1, 2, and 3. Please watch for the emails they are sending out to the respective Club Rep's and Youth Leaders at affiliated clubs. They will help you get on track with the new Youth Programming!

Amanda and Larry will be organizing Youth Curling Summits in their respective Regions later this month – please help them make these events a success.

These Youth Curling Summits will bring together Youth Curling Coaches, Youth Program Leaders, and Young people (16-25) interested in getting involved in the delivery of youth programs from your club and area clubs - to learn about the new and exciting Curling Canada and Ontario Curling Council developed programs for youth curlers. The programs will be instrumental to recruiting more youth to curling and keeping them involved.
